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Pastor's Column

We are living in extreme times. The level of rhetoric and escalating violence in our country and around the world is concerning. Polarization is running rampant among politicians, church folk, neighbors and throughout all of society. It's a troubling reality for all of us.

The resurrection of Jesus, the Good News of Easter, took place during an extreme period. The Jews were living under an oppressive, occupied empire of the Roman Government. Rebellions and wars were vast and many. And Jesus died a violent death at the hands of the state.

For over 2000 years, even going back to Old Testament times, God's children have been struggling to build a beloved community. They always get tripped up by human violence and oppression, often at the hands of extremists. People flourish, not at the poles or at extreme homogeny but within the context of diversity, challenge and possibility. And yet, over and over again, history repeats itself as we struggle to embrace all of God's good creation. I often find myself saying, "We've been down this road before and it doesn't end well for anyone."

So, what are the steps towards building a diverse, less polarized and loving faithful community? What is required of us to be the beloved community?

During the months of April and May we will be exploring this topic: *Building a Beloved Community – living between the extremes.* We will explore ways to balance between judgement and forgiveness, between varying beliefs including doubt, explore ways to remove obstacles and build foundations, explore the difference between challenge and oppression and finally, participate in celebrating the gifts of individuals and community. We will also get to hear from United Women in Faith who always stand as an example of beloved community.

I hope you will join us during this Easter Season to celebrate the beloved community that Jesus calls us to build. Hope to see you in worship!

Meet Pastor Tammy

Rev. Tammy Scott

Rev. Tammy Scott is the oldest of three sisters who grew up in Lockport, IL. From a very young age she was active in Sunday school and later, youth group at First UMC Lockport. Rev. Scott majored in communications at The University of Illinois at Chicago which has served her well in ministry. After college, Rev. Scott answered her call to ordained ministry which she realized had been present for many years. In 2006, Tammy earned her Master of Divinity degree at Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary in Evanston. She was commissioned a Probationary Deacon in 2006 and ordained a Deacon in Full Connection in 2009. In January 2018, Tammy's call to ministry shifted and she began to pursue ordination as an Elder. On April 24, 2021, Tammy was ordained an elder in The United Methodist Church.





Rev. Scott has served churches in Joliet, Wilmette, Bolingbrook, Minooka, Naperville, and Sugar Grove. Her ministry areas of focus have included children, youth, families, administration, leading Bible studies, as well as confirmation, in addition to preaching, and participating in pastoral care. Pastor Tammy currently serves as the Lead Pastor at Sugar Grove UMC in Sugar Grove, IL. Tammy is passionate about including all persons in the life of the church from the youngest to the oldest and everyone in between.

Beyond the local church, Tammy has served at both the district and conference level. She is currently a member of the Prairie South DCOM and the Chair of the NIC Conference Council on Finance &

Administration (CCFA). She has also led several workshops at district training events on stewardship, finance, and youth ministry. Tammy also served as one of the clergy leaders for the NIC Residency Programs for clergy during their provisional years and currently mentors a clergy candidate who is working toward ordination.

Pastor Tammy is mom to identical twin girls, Hannah & Haylee, who are currently in 2nd grade. Much of Tammy's free time is spent supporting her daughters in their favorite activities: cheerleading and Girl Scouts. Tammy's parents, Tom & Joan Biltgen, moved in with her and her daughters in February 2020 to offer additional care and support, little did they know how important that would be once the pandemic began. Pastor Tammy's favorite things include spending time with her daughters, nieces and nephews, and sisters whenever possible. She is a lifelong Cubs fan, a former triathlete and long-distance runner who has exchanged long runs for in-home workouts 4-5 days a week, and loves to be outdoors as much as possible in the warm months of the year.

Reflections on the Need to Create a Better Future

Wesley UMC Aurora's message is refreshing in comparison to my experience with other churches and Christianity at large. I went to two Churches when growing up. These two churches were the types that were ultimately the reason why I stopped attending Church. I will describe them to you. The first Church was in Ohio. I'd go there every few months when I visited my cousins. I distinctly remember the Pastor. He was a great storyteller, and I always left his services feeling inspired to be more kind. He often spoke of compassion: how we must love our family and friends. As I grew up, I went to church less and less, but I still held a fond image of him and his message. However, as I've grown up, and see the glaringly obvious structural failings of society to be loving, to be Christlike, I find it massively disappointing, how this man, clearly kind, well-meaning, and passionate, never suggested any aspect of Christianity and its relationship to things outside *personal life*. I'm aware that many enjoy Church as a solace from the political nightmare we currently live in. However, if we practice radical love, inclusivity, and social justice, these behaviors transcend politics, and are in themselves Christlike.

I don't mean to completely disparage the work of this Pastor. They did service, they did charity, and they certainly had a positive influence on me. However, I critique him because he can take it. Now, I believe it is the duty of the Church to simply move past treating the symptoms of problems (poverty, hunger, racism, violence), and treat the core problems. Although not all of us will agree on what needs to be changed, there is a growing sentiment that there are structural problems in the U.S. and the world. If your Church's message seeks to perturb nothing except an individual in their personal life, it is an implied acceptance of the status quo.

The other type of Church I attended was my Grandpa's church. It was very different from the first. His Church would actively grow a sense of fear amongst the audience. They cultivate a fear of the Other, and use this fear to defend the status quo. In essence, they say: We need to defend what we have, ourselves, our values, our current systems. The Other threatens the way things are. What these audiences see as their way of life, they might describe it as "simple", or "honest", or "anti-woke". They see divisions between people as "natural", and suffering is "deserved". As John has exposed with his recent messages on Substitutionary Atonement, these ideas that conservative Christians defend as "natural" or "Christian Values" are something that was constructed at a very particular point in time in history. In no way is it eternal, natural, or Christlike. It may be Christian, because it's the dogma that certain Churches have promoted, but that doesn't mean that it is what Jesus would have practiced. That's why I say Christlike rather than Christian. These ideas which govern the way most people see the world may have been implanted through the idea of substitutionary atonement. This idea that we suffer because we are sinners is deeply embedded in the psyche of the U.S.. This is where the idea "pull yourself up by your bootstraps" comes from. Or,

in the mind of conservatives, for example "immigrants should suffer because they don't belong here anyway". These ideas mirror ideas taught historically by Christian ideas of atonement. This is an idea so widely held, that most of us, myself included, tend to think of it as a fundamental part of reality. We *must* suffer because that is what life is. It's like the water a fish swims in, it's all around us. It's an incredible and necessary leap to undo this deep-seated thought. The idea of substitutionary atonement is an idea that arose along the course of human history: it was invented by a group with particular need for power. It is not how Jesus lived his life, or what he taught. Once we reach this understanding, we are capable of moving past this idea. We can imagine a different future, where Christianity stands not for "going back to Christian family values", but imagining a radically more Christlike future for Society.

For me, this is what is different about Wesley UMC Aurora. Sometimes I feel like I was thrust into a world already moving at such a breakneck speed that I feel overwhelmed, like how did we get here? I don't even know how to engage with the world, it feels like everyone is speaking different languages and about different things. There's so much knowledge and connectivity, but no meaningful meaning-making. The *modus operandi* at Wesley UMC is inclusion and revolution. Both of these ideas are consistently reflected in the content of the message every Sunday, music lyrics, and Generations Together meetings, to name a few. I hope that us at Wesley can continue to grow and partner with other groups that prioritize social change for the better.
