

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Pastor's Column

We are in the midst of a new series in worship for the month of March that is based on a book, "Taking on the Cross." The book asks a number of questions about the death of Jesus and the meaning of the cross. For example, if Christ died for our sins, why does sin still remain? And if sin is only partially removed from the world, what was the purpose of Jesus' death? Does our veneration of violence and suffering somehow perpetuate violence and suffering around the world in ways God would never have intended? So, for this Lent, I am inviting you to join me in taking on the cross and to embrace these questions as together we reimagine the meaning of Jesus' life and death.

We often use the word "atonement" to talk about the death of Jesus. "Atonement is reparation for an offense or for having caused or committed an injury. In the Old Testament, it is the cleansing, enacted in the temple, in which a sacrifice purifies both persons and place. In the New Testament, it refers to the reconciliation of God and humanity, connected with the death of Jesus the Christ." (Rita Nakashima Brock) During the season of Lent, we will be exploring the concept of atonement from the perspective of the Bible, theologians and the voices of those who are less familiar to us, all in an effort to equip and support you in constructing an understanding of atonement using modern and historic ways of thinking. It is my hope that this series helps you develop a deeper understanding of God and the work of Jesus.

I hope you will join us for this series both online and in-person. If you'd like a copy of the book, I have a few copies available. Let me know. Most of all, while I am not interested in changing anyone's understanding of the cross, I hope this series sheds light on the struggles that many people have with historic understandings of Jesus' death but also the implications these understandings have on us today. What does Jesus' birth, life, teachings, death and resurrection have to do with building community and the liberation of all of God's people? I hope to see you in worship!

Pastoral Transition Process

On the following page is a list developed from the collaboration meeting of every member of the Governing Board that was given to our Northern Illinois District Superintendent - Rev. Jeffry Bross. These are the attributes we would like to see in our next pastor, what we feel would make the best fit for Wesley. The Bishop and the Cabinet hold sessions each week to discern appointments from all the candidates available for all the churches that will have openings. After that decision is made, a candidate will be sent to Wesley for an introduction and to be greeted and questioned. Both the prospective Pastor and our Governing Board will decide if there are any unacceptable large red flags that would make that person unacceptable to Wesley or for the candidate. If there are none of these, this person will become our new pastor as of July 1. An announcement of this new appointment will be made immediately after this introduction and acceptance, which could be in the next several weeks.

Key Attributes for Senior Pastor

The Staff Parish Committee has established the following attributes required for a Senior Pastor at Wesley.

- 1. Administrative/Management
- Wesley utilizes a single board governance model for the overall management of the ministry. This
 means the pastor is the central figure in managing all of the day-to-day work of the church. The
 pastor needs to be familiar with and comfortable with operating in this governance model. This
 model employs paid staff positions and volunteer coordinator positions. The staff and coordinators
 are managed in their various roles by the pastor.
- The pastor leads staff/coordinators in engaging laity in all levels of the ministry and promotes the ministry of the laity.
- The Governing Board is the overall administrative body of the church and the focal point of strategic and future planning for Wesley. The pastor is a member of the Governing Board.
- 2. Explicit in expressing the meaning of Wesley being a Reconciling Congregation. Openly affirming inclusiveness and explicit in putting forth liberation for all people. Versed in cultural competency.
- 3. Wesley in the Aurora Community
- Wesley has established relationships and a long history of its presence in Aurora. The pastor will
 need to maintain existing points of presence and develop new relationships which enable Wesley to
 influence institutions and government operations in Aurora.
- There is discussion within the overall strategic direction of Wesley in Aurora on how Wesley can extend its ministries from other sites around the community.
- Asset Based Community Development has been one of the strategic tools Wesley has used in looking at its place in the immediate neighborhood and wider community. The pastor should be familiar with the concepts of ABCD and engage with the Governing Board in next steps.
- The pastor should be able to provide leadership in the promotion and presentation of Wesley in Aurora.
- With its location and extensive facilities Wesley is developing as a community center for a variety of groups. The pastor will be key in linking with groups that might make use of the facilities, extending Wesley into the community.
- 4. Embrace and utilize various forms of media to present Wesley and extend into the congregation and community. The pastor will be key in the online worship currently offered by Wesley. There has to be a level of understanding and competency in making use of the technology which makes Wesley available to a wider community. And yet, a balance, understanding that there are segments of the current congregation that are not comfortable with some of the new technology.

Laity Convocation Report

Report from the NIC Laity Convocation by Kathy Breazeale

I attended the February 11th Convocation via Zoom. We had a welcome and prayers from various Co-Lay Leaders of the Conference. The new Bishop, Dan Schwerin, spoke about the growth of our mustard seed baptism. As John Wesley said, we are growing together in love. Like the Disciples, we are sent to places we wouldn't usually go or are unknown to us. We are in utter reliance on God. The way of God being known is by our sharing. We need to be thinking outside the church, to serve where Jesus would have us do so. The big picture is that we are sent out to show Jesus's love and passion. Whatever you are paying attention to, there you will find growth. When you water a garden, it grows.

The Keynote Speaker was David Teal of Discipleship Ministries, the laity and leadership director.

- In a nutshell: Life is good, some things are wrong, someone help.
- His other nutshell: Your call has a place, your place has a call, place your call.
- Wesley said "I want you to be all love." All love means all love all. Love has a learning curve. Love makes a plan. We are constantly modifying our growth plan.
- "God is nowhere" becomes "God is now here."
- His best advice be the social life of Jesus in your zip code.

We had break out sessions and watched four videos of how churches in the conference are reaching outside their church buildings and how they are reaching their community. Wesley had a video presentation about how our summer camps have lead to our Wednesday Community dinners.

Some of the other churches are doing the following:

- holding a special worship service that is dementia friendly,
- holding appreciation dinners for the local Fire Department,
- keeping in contact with their local food pantries so that can relay to their congregation what is most needed,
- invite neighbors to be a part of craft show or pop up business fair,
- helping to clean up yard in their neighborhood
